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LESSON 1: Think Boldly

Summary:

- Led by the private sector, "Grand Vision" cast a bold vision for the Van Andel Arena and DeVos Convention Center.
- A destination asset study provided a roadmap for the next wave of downtown catalyst projects, including a riverfront amphitheater and a soccer stadium.

Reflections from attendees:

- "What I saw in Grand Rapids is boldness and a willingness to look past why not." —Christiaan Mader
- What is our bold vision for transformational destination assets?

Next steps:

 A group of core institutions will meet to build alignment, with broader engagement to follow.





LESSON 2: Plan Collegially

Summary:

- Born out of "Grand Vision," the business community formed "Grand Action" to lead the planning and execution of downtown transformational projects.
- Business leaders, philanthropy, and the public sector came together through Grand Action to work toward a collaborative plan.
- Private funding leveraged public funding for a common purpose.

Reflections from attendees:

- "In order to achieve success, broad collaboration is needed. Government, business, and philanthropy. No one can do it alone."
- "Plan the future you want, inclusively. Sell people on it. Then implement it."



LESSON 3: **Act Urgently**

Summary:

- Grand Rapids' business leaders understood that without drawing more activity into their downtown, their community was at risk of being hollowed out.
- Also, by diversifying its regional economy, Grand Rapids put itself on a growth trajectory, unlike other Rust Belt cities.

Reflections from attendees:

"We need to strike a balance between intentionality and urgency."



LESSON 4:

Concentrate Investment Downtown

Summary:

- "We had a President of the United States from Grand Rapids, and we couldn't even host a parade in our Downtown for the man," said Grand Action executive director Kara Wood, describing the embarrassing moment that sparked a sense of urgency led by the private sector to reinvest in the city's downtown.
- "The real heartbeat of a region is the Downtown, and without that heartbeat the region doesn't thrive," Wood continued.
- That's what inspired leadership from the private sector to turn downtown Grand Rapids into an economic engine and to focus their philanthropic investment there.

Reflections from attendees:

- "Downtown Lafayette is key to a regional cohesive strategy for people and place."
- "A vibrant Downtown benefits all of Acadiana."



LESSON 5:

Embrace "P3"s that Include Philanthropy

Summary:

- Public-private partnerships (P3s) are the standard operating procedure in Grand Rapids, where P3s often include philanthropy.
- This is especially true of Grand Action's downtown transformational projects, which were initiated through the support of large philanthropic gifts.

Reflections from attendees:

 "Two years ago in Pensacola, we saw how smart, proactive philanthropy rallied a community behind a collaborative vision. In Grand Rapids, we saw it again. Philanthropic organizations prioritized philanthropic investments around making downtown a great place." —Carlee Alm-LaBar



LESSON 6:

Higher Ed is a Cornerstone

Summary:

- Michigan State University's College of Human Medicine was a critical piece of the puzzle in the growth of Grand Rapids' Medical Mile a burgeoning health science district.
- Higher education partners are also critical to powering Grand Rapids' Tech Strategy.

Reflections from attendees:

• "Other than a med school, we have all the same pieces as Grand Rapids already in place."

Next steps:

• With the expansion of the New Iberia Research Center and the construction of a new CDMO, UL Lafayette will continue to lead the growth of a regional "Bieaux Tech" cluster.



LESSON 7:

Tech can Drive Economic Growth

Summary:

- Grand Rapids has a bold strategy to double the number of tech jobs over the next 10 years, led by the Technology Council of West Michigan, which includes 70+ employers.
- Technology can bolster every industry, and Grand Rapids is positioning itself to be at the forefront of technological change for industry and the workforce.

Reflections from attendees:

 The 'unplanned collisions' generated by Grand Rapids' Tech Council have led to organic partnerships and positive results.

Next steps:

• Key stakeholders will meet to discuss the formation of a Tech Council for Acadiana.



LESSON 8:

Ensure Benefits are Shared

Summary:

- Reflecting on how Grand Rapids is growing, community leaders are being intentional about how this growth is benefitting the population as a whole, rather than just one segment of the population.
- This growth can't be sustained without greater supply of attainable housing. That's why groups like Housing Next are focused on fostering quality housing for all.

Next steps:

• Strengthen collaboration to address homelessness and housing supply.

LESSON 9:

Leadership Development Never Stops

Summary:

- As one generation of community leaders takes a step back, they are being intentional about helping the next generation of community leaders take a step forward.
- Leadership development doesn't happen by accident, said Atomic Object Co-CEO Shawn Crowley. "You have to ignite people's curiosity and ambition."
- "We have to get the next generation involved, get them plugged in, be mentors to them, and show them the way," added Grand Action Co-Chair Carol Van Andel.

Reflections from attendees:

- Grand Rapids has a continuity of vision that transcends generations and political administrations.
- "We need to give up-and-comers an at bat."





LESSON 10: Do More of These Trips

Summary:

 The lessons learned and relationships built on Leadership Exchange have energized us, affirming the value of traveling as a delegation to aspirational cities like Grand Rapids.

Next steps:

- Attendees continue to unpack lessons learned and meet about carrying these lessons forward.
